W.F. Strong highlighted a night celebrating the 15th anniversary of the LBJ Museum of San Marcos. Strong — a Fulbright scholar, professor at the University of Texas Rio Grande Valley, author of two books on Texas, and Texas history and culture commentator for the Texas Standard Radio Network — served as the featured speaker at Saturday night's gala at the Holiday Inn San Marcos-Convention Center, sharing stories about President Lyndon B. Johnson. "I thought I'd share with you some of the stories [Johnson] told, given that you've had a long interest in him, you may know them already but pretend

that you don't," Strong said. "One of the stories that he loved. He always loved stories that naturally attacked government or explained government and he liked this story. "[Johnson] said, 'There was a boy who lived with his mom in Central Texas, very poor. His mom was very poor. The boy felt bad so he wrote a letter to God. He said, God, please send my mother \$100 because she really deserved it. And he sent it to the post office and the postmaster there sent it on. It went to the Postmaster General of the United States. And he read it and it touched his heart and he said, we can do something, and he put \$20 in an envelope with an air-mail stamp on it and mailed

SMPD arrests man on aggravated assault with deadly weapon charge following SWAT response

San Marcos police arrested a man on a charge of aggravated assault with a deadly weapon following a SWAT response Saturday. Raymond Davila, 31, was arrested after police attempted to serve a warrant at an apartment complex at 1617 Post Road, where multiple SWAT units responded. Officials said San Marcos Police Department officers were called to the

1600 block of Post Road for a report of an aggravated assault on Friday at approximately 4 p.m. Police determined Davila threatened individuals with a firearm after investigating the incident. Davila fled



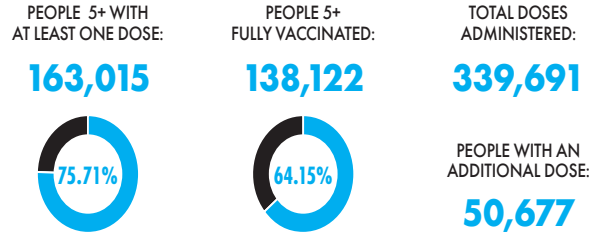

Nearly 42,700 San Marcos residents have been fully vaccinated against COVID-19, according to the Texas Department of State Health Services. As of Monday, 42,695 San

Marcos residents living in zip codes 78666 and 78667 are considered fully vaccinated, while 50,969 have received at least one dose. Meanwhile, 138,122 Hays County residents are considered fully vaccinated. SEE VACCINATED PAGE 2

TEXAS ECONOMY

With 50,000 jobs added in December, growth slowed but still beat U.S.

Texas added 50,000 non-farm jobs in December, and the state's unemployment rate ticked down again, but the pace of job growth slowed last month as the

omicron variant spread. December gains were lower than the 86,500 jobs added in November and lower than the gains in October and September. Texas still grew faster than the nation, with jobs rising 0.4% in December compared

with 0.1% for the U.S. "We're moving to a more normal, sustainable level of growth," said Luis Torres, research economist at the Texas Real Estate Research Center at Texas A&M University. "We're in expansion mode; we're not in recovery

anymore. And that's great news, right?" Job gains were led by the construction industry, which made 10,400 hires, and financial activities, which added 7,200, the
